Inspection judgements

Overall experiences and progress of children and young people: good

The children living at the home are making steady progress. Staff are relentless in seeking to provide high quality care for the children. Overall, children said that they like living at this home and that the staff are good at meeting their needs.

The relationships between staff, children and external professionals are strong and effective. All professionals indicated that children's needs are met well because they and the staff work together with the children in a transparent manner. One social worker described the home as the best that they had ever come across and another said that they would be happy to place another child there in the future.

However, there has been an unsettled period in the home. Four new children were accepted into the home within a month, with some arriving at very short notice. In some cases, the required information about children's needs has not been received and children have not had enough time to settle into the home. This has impacted negatively on children's experiences at times. Nevertheless, staff remain committed to the children's welfare.

Not all children are enrolled in education provision. Staff make significant efforts to support children with alternative education plans and they devise creative solutions when needed, such as incorporating learning independent living skills into education plans. Managers and staff also work closely and effectively with external professionals to ensure that appropriate longer-term educational arrangements continue to be sought.

The importance of family time is understood by staff. They encourage the children to spend time with their families and seek to support the children to have positive experiences with them. Staff also listen to children's views and make enjoyable arrangements, such as one child staying in bed and breakfast accommodation over their birthday weekend to enable them to spend plenty of time with a close family member.

Children's wishes and feelings are highly regarded. Children are invited to participate in decision-making about the home environment. Their rooms are personalised and reflect their interests and hobbies. Children also said that they know how to make complaints. However, children's backgrounds and cultural identities are not consistently given sufficient priority.

How well children and young people are helped and protected: good



Staff identify, understand and address children's individual risks and vulnerabilities, as they know the children well and have formed strong relationships with them. This has led to a significant reduction in the number of allegations and in the need for physical interventions. Staff also seek to educate children about their vulnerabilities and risks in the wider community.

Missing from home incidents are frequent. Staff consistently adhere to agreed support plans and risk assessments and are diligent in seeking to locate children and return them to safety.

Multi-agency networking is at the heart of the home's safeguarding culture. The registered manager works transparently with external professionals and consults the local authority designated officers when concerns about staff conduct and children's safety are brought to their attention. However, the expected procedures and safeguarding protocols have not always been followed consistently.

The effectiveness of leaders and managers: good

The registered manager is passionate about children's welfare and progress. They have high expectations regarding the quality of individualised care that staff should provide for children. Their expectations have been disseminated to staff so that managers and staff hold a shared vision of care. Staff respect the registered manager's commitment and dedication and say that the manager is supportive and has time for them.

The registered manager has good oversight and ensures consistent monitoring. This includes daily checks and monthly monitoring; children's progress is analysed and future goals for children are captured. The registered manager advocates for children's voices to be incorporated into plans for their future.

The registered manager applies reflective practice to all aspects of care. They bring relevant research into staff meetings and workshops, covering issues such as attention deficit hyperactivity disorder.

All staff complete the training that is deemed to be necessary by the organisation and is in line with the presenting needs of the children. Staff are supervised and appraised on a regular basis. This promotes the positive professional development of staff.

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Recommendation

- The registered person should ensure that staff play a full role in the understanding of who children are and where they come from, as this is recognised in good social work practice. In particular, staff should show genuine interest in children's backgrounds and consistently support their cultural identities.
